

MS Serious Case Review

Learning Notes

Child MS was a young baby who suffered a serious non accidental injury whilst in the care of parents. The full SCR will be published upon completion of parallel proceedings.

What did we learn?

- Consideration always needs to be given to the needs of the unborn via pre birth assessments.
- Assessments and direct work always need to consider both parents equally
- Good information sharing and clear communication between agencies is crucial, especially if there is any concern regarding possible bruising to an immobile baby.
- Professionals should always consider culture and diversity and the impact of cultural and/or language barriers.
- Without effective information sharing, the lived experience of MS could not be fully understood or parents' adequately supported
- Good practice was that school tenaciously raised concerns—this should be replicated across all agencies
